Comm Unity Plus Services works with diverse communities throughout Melbourne's Western and Northern regions, delivering a range of prevention and early intervention programs to disadvantaged, marginalised and socially excluded community members. Through Community Education, Brimbank Melton Community Legal Centre, Children's Contact Services, Neighbourhood House, and a range of community engagement and development activities.

#### **Highly Commended**



#### **All Ears Hearing**

All Ears Hearing is an audiology clinic committed to custom, patientcentred care and proven treatments. Founder, Mini Gupta, immigrated from Delhi, India, in 2006. Her lived experience means she has a deep understanding of the challenges facing immigrant patients and staff, and/or Australian-born people from multicultural backgrounds. Inclusivity and empathy are at the forefront of the clinic's workforce and services.



Recognising short-term projects or programs completed in the last 18 months that used outside-the-box thinking to address a problem facing a culturally diverse community and that shares knowledge about a culture with a wider audience.

#### Wellsprings for Women

This project has empowered people of African heritage to take back harmful narratives of their experiences and identities and centre real voices and issues. The project collected hundreds of stories and experiences that gave rise to an exhibit, films, workshops, and a digital story map of Greater Melbourne.

#### **Highly Commended**



#### Theresa Sengaga Ssali

The African Women and Families Network was founded by Theresa Ssali in 2011. It is a trusted grassroots community organisation, well known in the sector for providing support to highly vulnerable members of marginalised migrant communities, who were already isolated prior to COVID-19.



Recognising early childhood staff, services, schools, vocational education and training settings and not-for-profit organisations that deliver outstanding learning and teaching programs that enhance the social inclusion, wellbeing and education outcomes for children and students from culturally and linguistically diverse communities.

#### Winner - Early Childhood Education



#### City of Casey Best Start Cultural Communication Improvement Team

City of Casey's Best Start Cultural Improvement Team is a collaborative group of early years professionals working on improving cross-cultural communication between early years services and low and non-English speaking families. The improvement team is driving change to increase interpreter utilization in kindergartens, supporting greater participation, partnerships and inclusion.

#### ViệtSpeak

ViệtSpeak is a community-based organisation that is volunteer run and based in Melbourne's western suburbs. The group formed after the closure of the country's only Vietnamese bilingual program in Footscray Primary School in 2020 and comprises parents, community advocates, language educators and researchers.

#### **River Nile School**

River Nile School transforms young refugee and asylum seeker women's lives through education.

#### Highly Commended -School Education



#### Debney Meadows Primary School

Debney Meadows Primary School and Kensington Neighbourhood House have partnered to create the Debney Meadows Community Hub, a space for families from diverse cultural backgrounds to connect with the wider community. The Hub celebrates diversity and strengthens intercultural capability by providing opportunities for people to learn, share, and celebrate together.

#### Winner -Pre-accredited community-based Education and Training



#### **River Nile Learning Centre**

The RNLC's support extends beyond the classroom empowering generations of newly arrived refugees and asylum seekers. Graduates of the River Nile School emerge as empowered individuals, more confident in their English language skills, better equipped for the Australian job market and better able to thrive in the Victorian community. Highly Commended -Pre-accredited community-based Education and Training



#### **BSL Cross Cultural Consultancy**

Brotherhood of St Laurence's Cross-Cultural Consultancy in the Children's Programs Division hold a strong vision of cultural identity being essential to children and an individual's healthy sense of who they are and where they belong. Cultural and racial pride is essential for resilience building in the face of discrimination stress.



#### Winner - Vocational Education and Training Accredited Education & Training



#### VU Together Against Racism Working Group

The Together Against Racism working group are students and staff from diverse backgrounds who have led and co-created innovative online training. The group spent eight months co-designing content to move a learner from being 'not racist' to actively 'anti-racist'. The outcome goes well beyond compliance toward a transformative learning experience. Highly Commended -Vocational Education and Training Accredited Education & Training



#### Gordon Institute of TAFE

The Mumgu-dhal program at The Gordon inspires and supports young First Nations students to attain their education and career aspirations. Thriving within a dynamic realm of hands-on education and ongoing support, this experience not only nurtures self-assurance for the students but also creates valuable connections to culture, country, and heritage.



Recognising people, units, clubs or stations working or volunteering for Victoria's emergency services that promote and champion diversity and/or address the specific needs of multicultural communities.

#### Victorian State Emergency Service Greater Dandenong Unit

The Victoria State Emergency Service Greater Dandenong Unit has focused on building an engaged, inclusive, and culturally diverse volunteer membership, with the unit now able to provide better support and establish stronger relationships with the varied cultural groups that call Greater Dandenong home.



Recognising health practitioners, researchers and organisations that address the needs of people with culturally diverse backgrounds and/or provide outstanding health care, support or services to multicultural communities.

#### Program for Refugee Immunisation Monitoring and Education

PRIME supports and delivers culturally appropriate catch-up vaccinations for refugee background communities and increases immunisation coverage. PRIME teams include bicultural, multilingual staff who are embedded in local communities, working in local government and asylum seeker healthcare. Through supporting immunisation, PRIME delivers health, social and economic benefits to new arrival communities and to Victoria.

#### Silva Nazaretian

Silva is a dedicated advocate working tirelessly to meet the health and wellbeing needs of multicultural communities. Through co-design and open communication, she supports and promotes effective health messaging, ensuring it reaches and resonates with multicultural communities. Her efforts are amplified through a community champions network fostering inclusivity and empowerment.



Recognising people and organisations that promote or improve access for multicultural communities to the justice system, support or advocate for multicultural communities to address systemic issues within the justice system or promote cultural diversity and inclusion in the legal sector.

#### Northern Community Legal Centre and South-East Monash Legal Service

The Safe Landing Program supports victim/survivors of family violence on temporary visas to recover and thrive, by assisting them to navigate the legal system. Integrated family, family violence and migration lawyers assist people to access visas which allow them independence from perpetrators, intervention orders, financial compensation and family law orders.

#### Eastern Community Legal Centre & Eastern Health

ECLC is a leading multidisciplinary community legal centre in Victoria which works to prevent problems, progress fair outcomes and build community resilience. Its vision is: Human Rights; Fairness and Justice for all. The aim to prevent injustice, promote equitable access to legal help and to empower communities.

The SALDHIG project has supported Somali-Australian young people, their families and community over the past two years. It has been an innovative, best-practice example of inclusive community development work that has positively impacted over 4000 community members and has provided capacity building opportunities for professionals from 35 Banyule services.

For six years Senior Constable Griffiths has worked with female victims/ survivors of violence

and assault. She has assisted Wellsprings for Women and made regular presentations to female survivors outlining the role of police as well as helping her colleagues to better understand CALD women and girls and their fear of making police reports.

#### Inspector Dean Clinton



Inspector Dean Clinton is committed to the principles of Neighbourhood Policing, Among his

achievements is establishing the Hume Neighbourhood Policing Safety Committee, becoming a committee member of the Hume Interfaith Network, the Hume Multicultural Advisory Group, the Local Safety Committee and the Aboriginal Local Area Network.

#### Leading Senior Constable Heath Williams



Leading Senior Constable Williams has demonstrated the best values of Victoria Police in his

role as Monash Youth Resource Officer, and Police Aboriginal Liaison Officer. His commitment, dedication and passion make him a very worthy recipient of a Police Multicultural Award and a very good example to his fellow police officers.

#### Diversity Recruitment Program Media Campaign



The project, funded by the Department of Jobs, Skills, Industry and Regions, aims

diversify our workforce. It has 230 participants with 56 different cultural backgrounds and already 78 have passed the VicPol entrance examination and 39 have begun their training at the Police Academy.

Ms. Brooke Harding who is a senior project officer with the Mental Health Centre of Excellence

and Innovation of Victoria Police. A former resident of the United Arab Emirates, Brooke prepared and distributed Iftar Care packages containing dates and water during Ramadan.

#### PSO Sergeant Pushp Sidhu



PSO Sergeant Pushp Sidhu has worked closely with the Hindu and Sikh communities and

proactively represents police in skill and career programs, and LGBTQI+ conferences. She supported the community soon after the attack on Ukraine by enlisting the support of a Russian-speaking PSO colleague and organizing a community engagement event.

#### **PSO Sergeant Simarpal Kaur**



After arriving from India in 2009, she came to Victoria in 2014 joining Victoria Police as a PSO. She

has acted as a conduit with her own Sikh community, educating them in a gurdwara context on family violence, mental health issues, crime prevention and police and PSO recruitment.



Recognising people and organisations that support or advocate for the rights and needs of newly arrived refugees and asylum seekers, improve access to settlement services and/or employment pathways, and create opportunities for participation, contribution and belonging.
